Anthony Joshua, from Watford, has become the world heavyweight champion after his win over Wladimir Klitschko at Wembley Stadium.

A record 90,000 fans saw the battle between Anthony and Wladimir - the big fight pulled the biggest crowds for a boxing match for nearly 100 years.

Anthony Joshua is one of Britain's best professional boxers. He became very good at boxing from a young age, and won all his fights at amateur level. He then set a goal to become an Olympic champion and in 2012, Joshua won the gold medal in the super heavyweight category at the London Olympics.

Billionaire set to give away most of his fortune

A Norwegian billionaire has promised to give away much of his wealth.

Kjell Inge Roekke, a former fisherman who made his fortune in the oil industry, will begin by funding a research ship that will remove plastic from the ocean.

It will operate in partnership with the environmental organisation WWF.

Mr Roekke has an estimated wealth of £1.6 billion.

"I want to give back to society the bulk of what I've earned," he said in an interview with a local newspaper. "This ship is a part of that."

The research vessel will have a crew of 30, with space for up to 60 science staff and some laboratories. It will remove from the water and melt up to five tons of plastic a day, the newspaper reported.

Other wealthy business people who have pledged to donate to worthy causes:

- 🍎 Mark Zuckerberg, the founder of Facebook, has pledged to give 99% of his shares in his company to benefit good causes, including building strong communities and healthcare.
- 🍎 Microsoft co-founder Bill Gates has said he plans to give away 95% of his wealth, particularly on healthcare and global development.



Surfer survives 32 hours at sea



Matthew Bryce, who is 22 and from Scotland, had not been seen since he set off to go surfing off the Argyll coast on Sunday morning. Belfast Coastguard said he had been in the water since 11.30am on Sunday and was found at 7.30pm on Monday, he was found by a helicopter after 32 hours in the sea.

A spokeswoman said Mr Bryce, who was wearing a wetsuit, was hypothermic and had been taken to hospital in Belfast. He was said to be recovering well.

Dawn Petrie, from the coastguard, said, "He was extremely lucky. Hope was fading of finding the surfer safe and well after such a long period in the water and with nightfall approaching we were gravely concerned. But at 7.30pm tonight, the crew on the coastguard rescue helicopter were delighted when they located the man still with his surf board and 13 miles off the coast."

"He was kitted out with all the right clothing including a thick neoprene suit and this

must have helped him to survive for so long at sea. He is hypothermic but conscious and has been flown to hospital in Belfast." Back on dry land Mr Bryce said, "I am so grateful that I am now receiving treatment in hospital. I cannot thank those enough who rescued and cared for me, they are all heroes."
